

We marked our three year anniversary in 2023! Most of our beneficiaries are in Africa where needs are greatest. We also welcomed new team members, volunteers, and donors.

I grew up as a third generation Mormon believing that helping others is central to life's purpose. Although I left the church in my twenties, some things stuck like finding and living with purpose. Consequently, when we launched our nonprofit organization in 2020, it felt so natural and right.

There are many people who feel that living beyond self is important and meaningful. That's why our work and our team continues to grow and move forward little by little.

In 2023, Sunday welcomed 15 new teammates: Alen Amini, General Lenny Richoux, Mark Stanley, Catherine Kelly, Phillip Nguyen, Anthony Marozsan, Evan Buhler, Jason Bartz, Viren Merchant, Arya Taghdiri, Carrie Torres, Leong Jia Ming, Levi Adams, and my sister Rebekah Rasmussen.

Our team is now 73 members strong and our longevity is remarkable. We like Sunday and we don't quit! I'm starting to hope that we may be working together for the next 5, 10, or 20 years!

In 2023, we stepped up to help 337 beneficiaries in 22 countries. All of them are underserved entrepreneurs and most of them are female. Each of you made a direct impact in the lives of our beneficiaries and showed kindness with strangers you've never met. You did well.

OUR LENDING PROGRAMS

We lend *directly* to entrepreneurs around the world. We also lend *indirectly* with Kiva and Care where we primarily partner with zero interest lenders, Akhuwat in Pakistan and Camfed in Africa.

Direct Lending

Our direct lending program is our highest priority and what makes our work special and unique. Our direct lending program is global, tech driven, bootstrapped, flexible, and can we pivot from country to country on a dime.



Kiva

Kiva is a nonprofit crowdfunding platform that works with field partners. Unfortunately, the majority of Kiva's 200 field partners are high interest lenders not aligned with our mission which limits our support. Camfed, a zero interest lender and field partner in Africa, is a bright exception.



Care

Similar to Kiva, Care is a nonprofit crowdfunding platform that works with field partners. Unfortunately, the majority of Care's field partners are high interest lenders not aligned with our mission which limits our support. Akhuwat, a zero interest lender and field partner in Pakistan, is a bright exception.



Future Plans

- We'll launch an accelerator in 2024 with the goal of creating sister organizations to expand our work.
- We'd like to increase the size of our loans.
- We'd like to do collaborations and partnerships.
- We'd like to give microgrants to select small businesses.
- We'd like to organize a formal advocacy program.
- We'd like to have full-time paid staff.
